

# Assisted Dying for Terminally Ill Adults (Scotland) Bill

## Introduction

A proposal for a Bill to enable competent adults who are terminally ill to be provided at their request with assistance to end their life.

The consultation runs from 23 September 2021 to 22 December 2021.

All those wishing to respond to the consultation are strongly encouraged to enter their responses electronically through this survey. This makes collation of responses much simpler and quicker. No. I worry that assisted dying will be an "open door" to ever-increasing demands made about its extension to new cases. Abortion, a totally separate issue, I know, provides a good example around the world. From an exceptional tragic event done as a last necessity we have now moved to an almost "God-given" right to having it done without being advised against it and to have it at any stage in the pregnancy (up to 9 months in some countries). I fear that the same will happen with assisted suicide. If there is a need to work on something for the end of people's lives, improving palliative and psychological care is then a better way of ensuring dignity in death.
