

Assisted Dying for Terminally Ill Adults (Scotland) Bill

Introduction

A proposal for a Bill to enable competent adults who are terminally ill to be provided at their request with assistance to end their life.

The consultation runs from 23 September 2021 to 22 December 2021.

All those wishing to respond to the consultation are strongly encouraged to enter their responses electronically through this survey. This makes collation of responses much simpler and quicker. However, the option also exists of sending in a separate response (in hard copy or by other electronic means such as e-mail), and details of how to do so are included in the member's consultation document.

Q1. Which of the following best expresses your view of the proposed Bill?

Fully supportive

If an animal is terminally ill or no longer has a reasonable quality of life, they are humanely euthanised. People should have the same right to a dignified death at the time of their choosing. They should not have to travel to other countries where assisted dying is permitted which is only an option for those who can afford it.

I think it will require legislation as it has been a source of controversy for so long. The scope also needs widening and that will probably also require fighting for. It should not only be for the terminally ill but also for those where the quality of life is deteriorating. I do not want to end up in a care home with dementia or physically incapable of caring for myself.
