

# Assisted Dying for Terminally Ill Adults (Scotland) Bill

## Introduction

A proposal for a Bill to enable competent adults who are terminally ill to be provided at their request with assistance to end their life.

The consultation runs from 23 September 2021 to 22 December 2021.

All those wishing to respond to the consultation are strongly encouraged to enter their responses electronically through this survey. This makes collation of responses much simpler and quicker. However, the option also exists of sending in a separate response (in hard copy or by other electronic means such as e-mail), and details of how to do so are included in the member's consultation document.

Q1. Which of the following best expresses your view of the proposed Bill?

**Please explain the reasons for your response.**

For the last 18 months I have undergone cancer treatment, chemo, surgery, radiotherapy and now hormone and targeted treatments. There were times when I was so low, particularly at the start of the treatment, that I would have agreed to assisted dying. But, now I during my cancer journey I have come to terms with how strong the will to live is. It really isn't my choice or anyone else's choice or right to take away life.

Do not agree or support with assisted dying for terminally ill adults. I do not think there should be any form of legislation to make this legal. Totally immoral, life whatever the quality is a precious gift.
