

Assisted Dying for Terminally Ill Adults (Scotland) Bill

Introduction

A proposal for a Bill to enable competent adults who are terminally ill to be provided at their request with assistance to end their life.

The consultation runs from 23 September 2021 to 22 December 2021.

All those wishing to respond to the consultation are strongly encouraged to enter their responses electronically through this survey. This makes collation of responses much simpler and quicker. However, the option also exists of sending in a separate response (in hard copy or by other electronic means such as e-mail), and details of how to do so are included in the member's consultation document.

Questions marked with an asterisk (*) require an answer.

All responses must include a name and contact details. Q1. Which of the following best expresses your view of the proposed Bill?

Fully supportive

Please explain the reasons for your response.

No one should have a painful and miserable ending to their life. When folk are terminally ill, or very old and fed up with daily pain and disablement, they should have the right to decide when and how they die. When our pets are like that, we put them to sleep humanely. It should be the same with humans and their treatment of one another. Assisted dying is the best way to accomplish this end.

Q2. Do you think legislation is required, or are there other ways in which the Bill's aims could be achieved more effectively? Please explain the reasons for your response.

Legislation must be required to protect the rights of us all, both those who want an assisted death and those who help us to have one.

Just a thought on step 2....if someone is suffering greatly and there is no remediation to ease their pain in any way, then the period of reflection should be mercifully short. They should not have to suffer a moment longer than necessary. This is especially important too for those suffering Motor Neurone and such diseases where the distressed caused by loss of control over all sorts of things is unable to be made better in any way. I know two people who have suffered from MND...it is utterly awful.

Q4. Which of the following best expresses your views of the safeguards proposed in section 1.1 of the consultation document?

Please explain the reasons for your response.

I think what worries me in this section is the stricture that the person must manage to administer the final dose of medication by themselves. With many illnesses, that would be impossible, for example MND. The person afflicted may not be ready to die when they can still manage to do such a thing. So they should give their consent to have it administered by either a medical person, or someone like a partner, or other family member or friend if they are indeed unable to administer it themselves. This consent should be stated early on, written down legally and in a way that cannot be badly used.
