

Assisted Dying for Terminally Ill Adults (Scotland) Bill

Introduction

A proposal for a Bill to enable competent adults who are terminally ill to be provided at their request with assistance to end their life.

The consultation runs from 23 September 2021 to 22 December 2021.

All those wishing to respond to the consultation are strongly encouraged to enter their responses electronically through this survey. This makes collation of responses much simpler and quicker. However, the option also exists of sending in a separate response (in hard copy or by other electronic means such as e-mail), and details of how to do so are included in the member's consultation document.

The reflection period should be time limited to 6 months as most individuals know what their position is on assisted dying. The only question for MSPs is how far will they water down the options against the ideal Swiss model to appease the religious, medical, and disabled lobby.

Better than nothing but prefer a that individuals can declare their wishes in advance of a terminal illness diagnosis. I believe it's an individual that decides the time of death not a doctor.

Why should it need to be recorded as different. If restricted to terminal illness only, then the cause of death is still the terminal illness not the time it takes two doctors to decide if your wishes to go earlier are acceptable or not as per proposed legislation.

Q6. Please provide comment on how a conscientious objection (or other avenue to ensure voluntary participation by healthcare professionals) might best be facilitated.

I believe the doctors appointed for the decision making role should chose to do it and not be doctors who are coerced into assisted dying as part of their duty if they don't agree with it. A separate register of suitably medically trained individuals who want to carry out this role would be available and called in to advise, on assisted dying requests.
