

# Assisted Dying for Terminally Ill Adults (Scotland) Bill

## Introduction

A proposal for a Bill to enable competent adults who are terminally ill to be provided at their request with assistance to end their life.

The consultation runs from 23 September 2021 to 22 December 2021.

All those wishing to respond to the consultation are strongly encouraged to enter their responses electronically through this survey. This makes collation of responses much simpler and quicker. However, the option also exists of sending in a separate response (in hard copy or by other electronic means such as e-mail), and details of how to do so are included in the member's consultation document.

Yes, it is necessary because those that are against Assisted Dying (doctors, health care workers, etc.) would prevent some sufferers from being assisted to die if the patients happened to be under their care.

Having two doctors to assess the patient every step of the way seems a reasonable precaution.
