

Assisted Dying for Terminally Ill Adults (Scotland) Bill

Introduction

A proposal for a Bill to enable competent adults who are terminally ill to be provided at their request with assistance to end their life.

The consultation runs from 23 September 2021 to 22 December 2021.

All those wishing to respond to the consultation are strongly encouraged to enter their responses electronically through this survey. This makes collation of responses much simpler and quicker. However, the option also exists of sending in a separate response (in hard copy or by other electronic means such as e-mail), and details of how to do so are included in the member's consultation document.

Please explain the reasons for your response.

I know that the illness I have is terminal. I would like to leave life peacefully and kindly when the time is right. I find it amazing that we do not treat human beings as kindly as we do with animals.

Q2. Do you think legislation is required, or are there other ways in which the Bill's aims could be achieved more effectively? Please explain the reasons for your response.

I believe that legislation is required and that safety measures are part of that legislation, (i.e. ensure that the patient with the terminal illness WANTS to have a terminal injection/medicine.

1. Declaration: I fully support this section. 2. Reflection Period: Ideal. I particularly support the flexibility of the time period; 14 days might be normally appropriate but there will be situations where circumstances would be better met with a more rapid acceptance of the request. 3. Prescribing: HCPs should leave asap if asked.

1. Past written and witnessed request from a patient should be accepted if they have lost communication capacity when this business becomes legal.
2. It should NOT continue to be a criminal offence to end someone's life directly. What if the patient is unable physically?? Safe but practical measures - YES

Partially supportive

Please explain the reasons for your response, including whether you think this should be a new or existing body (and if so, which body) and what data you think should be collected.

This would depend on the time required by personnel and systems collecting data. If too long, the patient could die in agony whilst awaiting results. The essential data is that of 2 Doctors confirming terminal illness and the patient requiring assisted dying.

Q6. Please provide comment on how a conscientious objection (or other avenue to ensure voluntary participation by healthcare professionals) might best be facilitated.

In my opinion, the most important comments are from the terminal patient. If there are any conscientious objections, (and I can think of none which are not religious or with personal morally based objections), these should be legally challengeable - rapidly. Religious and/or similar objections should not be powered.
